What is Pentecost ?

On Sunday June 8 this year, Christians everywhere will celebrate Pentecost (or as it's known in the UK and Ireland, Whitsunday). What does the word Pentecost mean? Why do we celebrate it? Why do we wear red?

The word has its origin in the Jewish tradition. The word *Pentecost* is from the Greek for "fiftieth day", and was a name that Hellenistic Jews gave to a Jewish holiday called **Shavuot** which occurs on the fiftieth day after Passover. The ancient Jews called it Shavuot, which means "weeks" in Hebrew, because in Leviticus 23:15-16 God commanded the Jews to count seven full weeks (the length of their harvest season) beginning on the second day of Passover, and then present offerings of new grain to the Lord. So, it was a celebration in thanksgiving to God for the blessing of the harvest. Because of this it is also sometimes called "The Feast of Weeks", "Festival of Reaping", or "Day of the First Fruits". The Jewish holiday has a dual significance in that it also commemorates the day that God gave the Torah to the people through Moses on Mount Sinai fifty days after the Exodus. Jews today celebrate by decorating their synagogues and homes with greenery, eating dairy foods such as cheesecakes and cheese blintzes, and holding confirmation celebrations.


Christians celebrate their own Pentecost seven weeks (50 days) after Easter (inclusive of Easter Sunday), but the similarity to the Jewish holiday pretty much ends there.

Before his ascension, Jesus had instructed his disciples to wait in Jerusalem until they received the gift of the Holy Spirit, which would empower them to go out into the world and be his witnesses. In Acts 2:1-21 we are told that on the day of (Jewish) Pentecost, the disciples were gathered together in one place when "suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each." Peter got up before them and explained that this was the fulfillment of prophecy. Acts 2:41 records that after Peter spoke to the crowd some 3,000 people were baptized. Pentecost therefore achieved new significance to the early Christians because it launched the large-scale spreading of the Gospel after Jesus' ascension which was necessary for the growth of the Church, and for them it eventually lost its Jewish meaning. Traditionally, Pentecost is celebrated as the birthday of the Church.

Like the Jewish Pentecost, in many Christian churches the day is popular for confirmations. For many denominations it also begins a period of Ordinary Time on the Liturgical calendar which continues until the first Sunday of Advent.

And the color red? It symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. So, remember to wear red on Sunday!!

Amish Cooking 101

I love to travel into the Lancaster, PA. area and visit the Amish Countryside. It doesn't matter if I've been to the same place numerous times there is always something new. Over the years I have bought furniture and other odds and ends. The Amish are wonderful craftsmen. I also try to collect cookbooks from areas that I have visited. My cookbook collection does continue to grow. I've made things and am always amazed to find that things are not always as they seem. Case in point, I made potato bread expecting to have 2 loaves when in reality I had 3. The recipe called for 7-8 cups of flour but took 10 cups. These recipes are like the ones passed down from family. Never exact but close!

I'd like to share several recipes that are unique to the Amish.

Barbequed Limas

2 T. butter
2 T. flour
2 medium onions
1 ½ c. tomato juice
1 T. vinegar
½ c. water
2 T. brown sugar
lima beans

Fry onions in butter. Add everything else except the limas. Bring to simmer. Meanwhile, cook the limas in boiling water 5-10 minutes. Drain and add to sauce; pour into baking dish. Bake in 350 oven for 30 minutes. Note bacon or ham (diced) can be added when frying the onions.

Baked Corn

2 c. corn, fresh or canned	1 t. salt
2 T. fat	1/8 t. pepper
1 ½ T. flour	2 eggs
1 c. milk	½ c. butter crumbs
1 T. sugar	

Melt fat and add flour. Gradually add the milk stirring constantly until thickened. Add corn, sugar, S&P and heat. Remove from heat and add the eggs (Slightly beaten). Pour into baking dish, sprinkle with crumbs and bake at 350 for 35 minutes or until casserole is set.

Creamy French Dressing

1 medium onion chopped fine
1 c. sugar
1 t. salt
½ t. pepper and garlic powder
¾ c. oil
¼ c. water
1 can tomato soup
½ c. vinegar

Beat all together. Makes 1 quart. I remember this recipe from years ago and have made it. I always used a blender, poured into quart jar and refrigerated.

I've had to expand on the directions of the above recipes in order to have them make sense. Case in point: the limas. Still have no idea how much to cook but would start with a 1 pound package and add another. I'd like to end with....

*Recipe to Live By

*Re printed from Amish Cooking

Blend 1 c. of love, add ½ c. of kindness. Add alternately in small portions 1 c. appreciation and 3 c. of pleasant companionship into which has been sifted 3 t. of deserving praise. Flavor with 1 t. carefully chosen advice. Lightly fold in 1 c. cheerfulness to which a pinch of sorrow has been added. Pour with tender care into small clean hearts and let bake until well matured. Turn out on the surface of society, humbly invoke God's blessing and it will serve all mankind.
